

The Resilience of Trees



Fire in one instant can scar everything on its path, just like what happened with many of the fires that spread in close distance to the Bay Area throughout the past couple of years.

Natural disturbances, such as fire, are part of nature's cycles. Fire is very important in the natural patterns of many ecosystems around the world. They maintain the health of forests and grasslands by recycling nutrients and vegetation on the ground. There are several adaptations that plants and trees

have developed in order to protect themselves to endure fire regimes.

For example, at first glance these may look to you like Italian Cypress (Cupressus sempervirens) trees, we thought the same. It turns out that these trees are Coast Redwoods (Sequoia sempervirens). The reason as to why they look like this is because they got burned during the Tubbs Fire at Coffey Park in Santa Rosa.

Redwoods have adapted to endure droughts and fires by developing thick bark with thick groves running vertically along the tree. It's been noted that this protective layer of bark can grow up to one foot in thickness! Another adaptation that protects them during fires is their high-water content and their ability to sprout new trees from the root ball.

Another example of an adaptation of the plant world with fire is that there are certain species of plants which require fire in order for their seeds to begin germinating, such as the Lodgepole Pine.

Without a fire regime where fire is a common part of the ecosystem, many plants and trees would not be able to exist and reproduce. Land management companies have learned by introducing controlled fire systems in various habitats it allows to maintain and allow the thriving populations of the forests live a much longer and healthier life.
